CJLEADS INTERAGENCY LEADERSHIP COUNCIL TO MEET ON APRIL 14

RALEIGH – The CJLEADS (Criminal Justice Law Enforcement Automated Data Services) Interagency Leadership Council will meet **Wednesday, April 14 at 3 p.m. in the Banner Elk Conference Room, 3514 Bush Street, Raleigh.** The Council was formed by Controller David McCoy in 2009 to help with the successful integration of the state’s criminal justice data.

Agenda items include a demonstration of the CJLEADS application as well as a discussion of how the project will be rolled out to Wake County during the next year. (Meeting agenda attached.)

Members of the Council include Alvin Keller, Secretary of Correction; Linda Hayes, Secretary of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention; Reuben Young, Secretary of Crime Control and Public Safety; Judge John W. Smith, Director, Administrative Office of the Courts; Robin Pendergraft, Director, NC State Bureau of Investigation; Mike Robertson, Commissioner, Department of Motor Vehicles; Tim Ledford, President of the North Carolina Association of Chiefs of Police; Eddie Caldwell, Executive Vice President of the North Carolina Sheriff’s Association; and Owen Harris, FBI Resident Special Agent for North Carolina, ex officio member.

The Wake County Criminal Justice Pilot Program is integrating data found within the state’s various criminal justice applications and will provide up-to-date criminal information in a centralized location via a secure connection for use by state and local government criminal justice professionals.

The State Controller is North Carolina’s chief fiscal officer. The Office of the State Controller serves as an independent resource to ensure the financial integrity of the State by providing accounting, disbursing, payroll, internal control and financial reporting systems that serve state agencies, employees and the public and maximizing financial return through its statewide cash management plan. The OSC issues numerous financial reports including: Financial Highlights, General Fund Monthly Financial Report, IT Expenditures Report, Statewide Accounts Receivable Report, the State’s Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) as well as the short, easy-to-read version of the CAFR known as the “popular” report.
